<u> 2nd Called Special Session</u>

The 2nd Special Session of the 89th Texas Legislature began immediately after closure of the first and started with the same items. The 2nd session began without issue and obtained a quorum and bills filed from the first special session were re-introduced.

HOUSE BILL 23

House Bill 23 in this second called session repeats a bill I filed during the regular session that passed out of the House of Representatives and died in the Senate during the final days. The bill codifies the current property tax exemption granted to the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo (HLSR). Each year they have had to wait to see if the exemption was going to be granted and as a large charitable non-profit organization, this creates significant challenges in trying to plan and prepare their operational budget. The Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo has a nearly 100 year history of promoting youth and agriculture, providing over \$600 million dollars in scholarship to youth across the state. This bill also ensures that these tax exemptions are limited to the non-profit areas of the HLSR.

The bill has once again been voted out of the House and has now passed out of the Senate and should be on the way to the Governor for approval.

SENATE BILL 16

Senate Bill 16 is a bill that deals with real property theft and fraud, a problem that has been on the increase and was added to the special session by the Governor. I filed an amendment to SB 16 specifically to address fraudulent liens being filed by inmates, or other people on their behalf, against property belonging to employees of TDCJ. This amendment allows notification to the Secretary of State to investigate the legitimacy of claims. Recently, false documents have been filed as a means of harassment or intimidation against TDCJ personnel, causing them significant burdens to defend their property against baseless liens.

With this amendment, the Secretary of State can work with the Texas Attorney General to investigate and "terminate" fraudulent lien filings.

The legislature also completed a number of the issues associated with items on the Governor's call for the 2nd called Special Session. Included in this were several bills that were vetoed in their previous form during the regular session and weren't completed.

<u>House Bill 16</u> is the Omnibus Court Bill that creates new courts and judicial districts. It also identifies changes to the management, proceedings, and security of the court system and other administrative practices.

<u>House Bill 25</u> provides over the counter access to the drug Ivermectin and allows a pharmacist to dispense the drug without a prescription.

<u>House Bill 26</u> provides the authority for the Sheriff and Constables in Harris County to authorize a contract with home owners association, school district, or property owner for law enforcement services.

<u>House Bill 192</u> establishes prohibitions on commissioner's court transferring money out of the Sheriff or Constables budgets in Harris County or from placing restrictions on expenditures. The bill establishes requirements for an election for budget reductions in law enforcement agency budgets.

<u>Senate Bill 3</u> provides a grant program for flood prone areas to establish a siren or warning system to inform citizens of impending flood events in susceptible locations. It also requires the Texas Water Development Board to identify each area that has a history of consistent or severe flooding that warrants the installation of flood warning systems.

Senate Bill 12 firmly establishes the Texas Attorney General's authority to prosecute violation of Texas

Election Law.

The legislature also completed the Governor's request for redistricting, second chance for trafficking victims, real property theft and real property fraud legislation. Several other bills are still pending as of this writing with just a few days left in this Special Session.

New Legislation School District Cell Phone Policy

As a result of <u>House Bill 1481</u> from the 89th Session of the Texas Legislature, all Texas school districts must develop, adopt, and implement a policy prohibiting the use of personal communication devices by students on school property during the instructional part of the school day. This new law requires school district to have a written policy in place no later than September 18, 2025. Districts may use differing approaches that may include a ban on possession, restricting use, or designating secure storage. The statute requires the policy include a disciplinary plan for violations and policies must be in place by September 18, 2025.

Exceptions to this new law are able to be made in order for districts to accommodate a student's individualized education plan or other documented needs that require such a device.








Simple Steps to Save a Life: School Zone/ Bus Stop Safety

It might feel like we were just singing school being out for the summer, but it's already time for our scholars to go back! That means that school buses are picking up and dropping off and school zones are activated. Let's remember these simple steps for thoughtful, responsible driving during this school year.

Slow Down: Please adhere to speed limits in school zones when they're activated in the early morning

[†] Overpressure, Explosion, Severe Weather, Natural Disaster, Special Incident, Mutual Aid

and afternoon hours. Even if you don't see students or blinking lights, err on the side of caution and slow down.

- Stop for School Buses: School buses make frequent stops along roadways to pick up and drop off students. Pay attention to their speed if they're slowing down. Watch for the yellow flashing lights that mean the bus is preparing to stop. When the lights start flashing red and they extend the stop sign, DRIVERS ON BOTH SIDES OF AN UNOBSTRUCTED (meaning there is no median/ physical barrier dividing one side of the road from the other) ROAD MUST STOP IN BOTH DIRECTIONS.
- Eliminate Distractions: Put away your phones and other distractions. Children are unpredictable and may dart into the street without looking.
- Watch for Children: Be extra vigilant and look for children walking or biking, especially in the early morning and afternoon hours.

We know that you have many choices when it comes to your child's education, and we think the best choice is right here in CFISD. Help us share the great things happening in CFISD as we continue

to Choose the Path to Amazing.

The school year begins with a celebratory tone after we received some positive preliminary 2025 accountability results from the Texas Education Agency (TEA). While these results are preliminary and awaiting final confirmation, they reflect the hard work of our students and staff. Every high school CFISD campus is expected to earn an "A" or "B" rating from the 2025 accountability ratings, and none of our campuses earned lower than a "C." Kudos to all of our staff and students for the incredible work it took to earn this achievement! While the district came in as a "B," we are committed to returning to an "A" this school year.

We were also pleased to announce in June the restoration of full transportation services to all homes in the district. While budget constraints in 2024-25 affected students living within 2 miles of their school, the Board made restoring full transportation a top priority for 2025-26.

With the addition of bus routes, our transportation team is hiring more drivers, attendants and technicians with paid training and new hire stipends. IN A AND B SCHOOLS IN TEA ACCOUNTABILITY

DOUBLE-DIGIT GAINS IN A & B RATED SCHOOLS

Klein, Texas—Klein ISD has earned an A rating in the College, Career, and Military Readiness (CCMR) component of the Texas Education Agency's (TEA) A–F Accountability Ratings, reflecting the district's strong focus on preparing every student for success after graduation.

Additionally, Klein ISD maintained a B rating overall, increasing from an 80 in 2023 to an 84 in 2024 and now to an 86 in 2025. Klein ISD continues to outperform both regional and state averages. Rising Standards, Continued Excellence

In 2023, the Texas Education Agency reset the state accountability rating system to more challenging academic performance standards. Despite the challenges of new tests, increased standards, and scoring changes, Klein ISD remains ahead of the curve. Since the increased performance standards were established by the State in 2023, Klein ISD has seen a:

- 30% increase in A-rated schools
- 13% increase in B-rated schools
- 55% decrease in C-rated schools

Additionally, no Klein ISD schools earned an overall D or F rating in 2025.

"Earning an 'A' in College, Career, and Military Readiness is proof that we are living out our shared vision of every student exiting with a purpose, well-prepared to succeed in life after graduation," Superintendent Dr. Jenny McGown said. "I'm so proud of our students and educators for their dedication and hard work that continues to yield improved results."

Record Gains for High Schools, All High Schools and Intermediate Schools Earn 'A' or 'B' The 2025 accountability ratings highlight significant improvement and consistency across Klein ISD high schools and intermediate schools. Since 2023:

- Klein High improved from B to A, rising 7 points from 85 to 92
- Klein Cain improved from C to B, rising 8 points from 79 to 87
- Klein Collins maintained a B, rising 7 points from 81 to 88
- Klein Forest improved from D to B, rising 15 points from 66 to 81
- Klein Oak improved from B to A, rising 10 points from 80 to 90

"We're proud of the academic growth these results represent for our students and educators," Chief Academic Officer Dr. Anthony Indelicato said. "We will continue working hard to ensure a bright future for all of our learners in Klein ISD."

127 Total Distinctions Earned

Students across Klein ISD earned subject-area distinctions and recognition for school-wide academic growth, representing a 37% increase in distinctions earned since the state reset the accountability system in 2023.

- 21 schools recognized for Academic Achievement in Mathematics
- 13 schools recognized for Academic Achievement in Reading and Language Arts
- 19 schools recognized for Academic Achievement in Science
- 2 schools recognized for Academic Achievement in Social Studies
- 31 schools recognized in Postsecondary Readiness
- 17 schools ranked in the Top 25 percent for Comparative Academic Growth
- 24 schools ranked in the Top 25 percent for Comparative Closing the Gaps

"Our students' continued success reflects the incredible heart and hard work of our educators, families, and community," Dr. McGown said. "Working together for our kids is what powers these excellent

results."



The Infrastructure Division administers and manages Precinct 4's Capital Improvement Projects Program. The CIP program includes road expansion projects, traffic signals and intersection improvements, and traffic management systems designed to improve mobility and air quality.

The Infrastructure Division also oversees the Child Safety Fund which is used to provide warranted school zone flashing warning signals in compliance with Precinct 4's criteria, the installation of a warranted traffic signal system facilitating the movement of traffic around a school facility to promote student safety. 
